Did you know that Honor Heights Park was formerly known as Agency Hill and Spaulding Park was originally a Tourist camp on the Jefferson Highway?





Honor Heights Park was purchased in 1909 by the City of Muskogee from the Creek Nation.

The park's old English style of flowing, terraced landscape were designed on paper by Chicago landscape architect Myron West in 1919. George Palmer, an English gardener, prepared the roads, walks and flower beds during the 1920's and 1930's.

Henry Bresser, a pioneer Muskogee Florist and owner of the Bresser Greenhouse and Nursery, had a hand in the growth of Honor Heights Park too. Every time Henry would introduce a new plant to Muskogee, he always wanted to plant one in the park. Thus, there are many trees that could not be found anywhere else at that time. Such as Libocedrus, Cedrus special, Old Sugar Maples, Chamaecyparis and more.

Robert Bebb started the Bebb Floral Co. on South 4th street with 10 blocks of Greenhouse range in June 1910. When Honor Heights Park was in its beginning stages, the Bebb Floral Co. donated thousands of forced flower bulbs to the City Park Department to start the planting at the foot of the hill and around the rock garden.

In the 1950's, azaleas were first introduced into the park and in 1967, the Muskogee Parks and Recreation Department, alongside the then park Director; Arthur C. Johnson, started a promotion known world wide now as The Azalea Festival.








Thank you all for making the 11th Annual BRWHC a success!
